Bill Summary: The bill appropriates up to \$5.5 million from current fund balance in the Southbank CRA tax increment district in the FY13-14 (\$1,705,545) and from future CRA revenues in FY14-15, FY15-16 and FY16-17 to the design and construction of a "context sensitive" redesign of Riverplace Boulevard from Prudential Drive to Museum Circle. The bill provides for carry-over of funds from one fiscal year to the next and designates the Public Works Department as the oversight agency in conjunction with approval from the Downtown Investment Authority. The bill waives any provisions of Sec. 654.111, Design Standards – Streets, in the Code of Subdivision Regulations which may conflict with the principles of "context sensitive streets" in order to promote economic development in the area by providing for a safer, more attractive pedestrian and bicycle-friendly street, parking and sidewalk system.

Background Information: In 2013 the City Council adopted Ordinance 2013-185-E endorsing the use of "context sensitive streets" that may deviate from the usual City roadway standards in order to customize pavement width, parking arrangements, sidewalk location and width, bicycle lanes, etc. to harmonize with the surrounding land uses and to encourage and protect alternative means of transportation such as walking and bicycling. The bill created a Context Sensitive Streets Standards Committee within the Public Works Department to consider and advise upon deviations from the standard subdivision and roadway construction regulations for purposes of encouraging the construction of context sensitive transportation facilities. This bill appropriates current and future funding from the Southbank CRA tax increment district to re-make Riverplace Drive as a context sensitive street.

Policy Impact Area: Economic development; alternative transportation enhancement

Fiscal Impact: The bill appropriates up to \$5.5 million in current and future Southbank CRA tax increment revenue for the design and partial construction of the refashioned roadway.

Section 17.02, *Jacksonville Charter*, provides that the nine members of the Board shall be residents and qualified electors of the City of Jacksonville, and five of the members shall be appointed by the Mayor, subject to the confirmation by the City Council.

Mr. Finley received an associate's degree in general education and is a Library Assistant with the Jacksonville Public Library. He resides in the Riverside area within Council District #14.

NOTE: Section 17.02(c), *Jacksonville Charter*, provides that no member of the Civil Service Board shall be an agent of or employed by the City of Jacksonville, the JEA, the Duval County School Board, or any collective bargaining organization representing employees of the City of Jacksonville, the JEA, or the Duval County School Board. Mr. Finley is an employee of the City of Jacksonville and President of AFSCME Local 1279.

Additionally, the term expiration date may need to be amended from June 30, 2016, to **June 30**, **2017**, as terms on the Civil Service Board are for three-years and Mr. Cameron's term ended June 30, 2014.

Background Information: The Jacksonville-Duval County Council on Elder Affairs is established pursuant to Chapter 82, Ordinance Code, and charged to serve as an advocate, for the older persons in the city, to the governmental agencies responsible for the various plans and programs designed to help older persons; assist in the implementation of plans and programs selected by regional organizations, as they relate to the city and its citizens; and designate priorities among programs developed in the city by public, nonprofit and private providers concerning older persons. Section 82.101, Ordinance Code, provides that five of the members of the Council on Elder Affairs shall be appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by the City Council.

Dr. Tannenbaum received a doctorate degree in dental surgery from the University of Pennsylvania and is the General Manager and Senior Consultant with Tannenbaum Healthcare Advisors. He resides in the Avondale area within Council District #14.

Background Information: During its budget hearing deliberations the Finance Committee had numerous questions about the status of various CIP projects to which and from which funding had been transferred under the Mayor's administrative transfer authority. The committee felt it prudent to request a moratorium on transfers of funding among projects while the Budget Office and Council Auditor's Office work collectively to arrive at a firm, reliable listing of project authorizations, actual borrowing, expended and escrowed funds, and remaining project capacities for the committee to utilize in making a recommendation to the full Council on the CIP for FY14-15.
