Bill Summary: The bill amends the Jacksonville Housing Finance Authority's (JHFA) guidelines for affordable housing loans to private developers in order to raise the maximum City contribution to project applications to make Jacksonville projects more competitive for funding on the state level. One-cycle emergency passage is requested.

Background Information: The JHFA's loan guidelines currently state that the City will determine its maximum contribution toward an affordable housing project seeking state bond financing based on the amount required by the Florida Housing Finance Corporation's scoring matrix for a project to obtain the highest number of points in the category grading local financial contribution to a project. The JHFA has determined that Jacksonville projects are being less successful at obtaining funding because projects in other counties have larger public contributions. The JHFA proposes to amend its loan criteria to increase the maximum contribution to either "(a) that minimum amount to allow local projects (located in Duval County) to successfully compete under the FHFC's guidelines (whether for Housing Tax Credits or FHFC programs, or (b) such loan amount as necessary to make local projects financially feasible as determined by a third-party credit underwriter." The addition of the language regarding amounts necessary to make local projects financially feasible would permit the JHFA to make larger financial commitments to projects which would have the effect of making them more competitive against projects from other counties should the FHFC resort to "tiebreakers" among otherwise equally ranked projects. One of the tiebreakers favors projects with greater local financial backing, which presumably indicates greater local confidence in and support for a project than others with only the minimum funding commitment.

Bill Summary: This bill confirms the Mayor's appointment of Jack L. Meeks, Jr. to the Downtown Investment Authority Board, replacing Paul I. Perez as a banking/finance industry representative, for an unexpired term ending June 30, 2014, followed by a first full four-year term ending June 30, 2018.

Background Information: The Downtown Investment Authority is established pursuant to Chapter 55, Part 3, Ordinance Code, and charged as the sole development and community redevelopment agency for Downtown for the City of Jacksonville pursuant to Chapter 163, Part III, Florida Statutes. Section 55.307(b)(1), Ordinance Code, provides that five of the nine members of the board be appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by Council, in various categories, including a member of the banking or finance industry.

Mr. Meeks received a bachelor's degree in accounting from the University of Florida and is a certified public accountant. He is President of Jack Meeks & Associates, CPAs, LLC, and previously served on the Jacksonville Economic Development Commission, Enterprise Zone Development Agency Board and the Jacksonville Ethics Commission. Mr. Meeks resides in the Springfield area within Council District #7.

Bill Summary: The bill amends Ordinance Code Chapter 799 – Local Option Gas Tax – to provide for a 20 year extension of the gas tax from 2016 through 2036. The bill also directs the inclusion of an editorial note in the Code section to list the legislative history of the City's local option gas tax.

Background Information: The City Council expressed its intention via resolution to adopt a local option gas tax for 5 years in 1983, but that intention was never put into action. In 1985 the Florida Legislature amended the statute to allow for a local option gas tax term of 10 years, which the Council adopted in 1986 extending to 1996. In 1987 the Florida Statutes were amended to allow counties already levying a local option gas tax to extend that tax in multi-year increments, but the wording was changed in a way that makes it unclear if a 30-year cap on the total length of all extensions of the tax is still in effect or not. In 1991 the City renewed the local option gas tax for 20 additional years from August 1996 to August 2016, for a total of 30 years from the initial 10 year levy of 1986.

When the tax was extended in 1991 the City committed to funding the JTA mass transit subsidy (formerly paid out of the General Fund) with proceeds of the local option gas tax (excluding the Skyway - Ordinance 91-819-411). When the Better Jacksonville Plan was adopted in 2000 the City and JTA entered into an Interlocal Agreement providing for uses of both the local option gas tax and the local option BJP sales tax for mass transit subsidy and for BJP road projects according to a 3-tiered priority system. In recent years the entire amount of the gas tax has gone to JTA for transit subsidies.

Policy Impact Area: Transportation funding

Fiscal Impact: The local option gas tax was budgeted to produce \$28 million in FY12-13 and \$28.6 million in FY13-14.
