Bill Summary: The bill amends Ordinance Code Chapter 60 – Human Rights Commission – to reduce the membership of the commission from 20 to 11 members and to change the threshold voting requirement for the board to take official action from 9 to 7 members. The bill requests emergency action so that the reduction by attrition can begin immediately and currently pending appointments would be prohibited.

Background Information: The Human Rights Commission currently consists of 20 members appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by City Council. The ordinance currently requires that at least 9 members present (45% of total membership) must concur in a report or recommendation for the commission to take official action. The amendment would reduce the commission membership to 11 and the threshold vote for taking corporate action to 7 members present (63.6% of total membership). The bill states that the membership reduction will take place through attrition as commissioners with expiring terms are not replaced. Emergency action is requested because 3 reappointments and 1 new appointment to the board are currently pending, and appointment of those members would delay the reduction by attrition by 3 years until those terms end.

Bill Summary: The bill appropriates \$26,076,178 within the Better Jacksonville Plan Unified Courthouse Program and \$291,985 in debt proceeds for the purpose of encumbering \$26,368,173 for the build-out of the State Attorney's Office in the old federal courthouse.

Background Information: At several meetings of the Special Courthouse Oversight Committee, representatives of the State Attorney's Office have expressed concern that the funding for the renovation of the old federal courthouse into the new State Attorney's Office may be jeopardized by on-going issues at the new county courthouse which may lead to funds being administratively reallocated with the Unified Courthouse Project to deal with courthouse issues, leaving insufficient funds under the \$350 million cap to complete the state attorney's office as planned. This bill would formally encumber funding for the construction of the state attorney's office and for moving expenses, contract administration and other project related costs, necessitating further Council action should any of the funding be contemplated for other uses.

Policy Impact Area: State Attorney's office construction

Fiscal Impact: The bill would encumber \$26,368,173 of existing funds within the Unified Courthouse Project for allocation to the State Attorney's Office construction project.

Background Information: This appropriation continues civic-core downtown enhancements that were initiated by projects funded by Ordinance 2009-215-E. The 2009 improvement enhancements included making Laura Street a two-way thoroughfare, planting trees into the ground, installing historic lights, new sidewalks, making traffic signal boxes more like kiosks in the Laura Street and Bay Street areas. The enhancements funded by this ordinance include the area in front of the Jacksonville Chamber of Commerce building on Independence Drive. The locale is located in Council District 4.

Prior to that approval, any expenditures from the downtown fund must be approved by City Council, as must any appropriations of funds from the countywide fund at any time.

Background Information: The Alta Road project will widen Alta Road to a 5-lane urban section from I-295 to New Berlin Road. Total project cost is estimated between \$12 million (as shown on the attached CIP listing sheet) and \$14.5 million (referenced in the bill text). The funding being allocated is fair share proceeds and interest accrued within Fair Share Sector 6.1 where the Alta Road project is located.

Background Information: The first recorded death of a police officer in Jacksonville was in 1840; since that first recorded death, there has been 60 uniformed police and corrections officers slain in the line of duty. The Jacksonville Fraternal Order of Police Foundation, Inc. recognizes the importance of remembering and honoring police and corrections officers who have made the ultimate sacrifice by giving their lives for the preservation of peace and order in the City and to save the lives of others. The memorial square will enable the citizens of Jacksonville to celebrate the lives lost in the protection of our community throughout the year and in conjunction with the National Law Enforcement Memorial services held annually in the month of May. The Foundation would construct and maintain a Law Enforcement Memorial at the square, at the Foundation's own expense. The project site is located in Council District 7.

Background Information: Applying for FIND grants is an annual undertaking. FIND returns to counties a portion of ad valorem taxes that FIND annually collects from the County's taxpayers to fund waterways projects. The Administration compiles list of waterways projects together for FIND funding. The Jacksonville Waterways Commission vets those projects and makes recommendations to the City Council on the merits and priorities of the projects. FIND requires that when applications for grants are submitted, counties must include a resolution that acknowledges the county's willingness to meet matching fund requirements. Projects on the FIND Prioritized Project List for 2013-2014 include: Exchange Island; sisters ICW Dock Redesign; Ortega Channel Markings; County Road Boat Ramp; Northbank Riverwalk Bridge; Geffen Kayak Launch; Northshore Kayak Launch; Lighting at 4 Boat Ramps; Reed Island; Harborview Dredging; continuation of Blue Cypress boardwalk. Most of the projects involve the design and permitting for docks, kayak launches and the installation of amenities. One of FIND's missions is providing funding for projects that increase the public's access to waterways.

Fiscal Impact: The resolution acknowledges the City of Jacksonville's willingness to meet FIND's matching fund requirements as they relate to the 2013-2014 projects.

Background Information: Duval County established a Manatee Protection Plan in 2000 (Resolution 2000-238-A). On an annual basis, the County submits an update to the Manatee Protection Plan to the Florida Fish & Wildlife Conservation Commission. The update consists of manatee data and research that is compiled by Jacksonville University. The City of Jacksonville contracts with Jacksonville University for the collection of manatee research and data; JU provides monthly reports on manatee data to the Jacksonville Waterways Commission. The Waterways Commission reviewed and approved the 2011-2012 Annual Update at its regularly scheduled meeting on November 14, 2012. The Update does not represent any changes in the Manatee Protection Plan per se but is a compilation of data and research on manatees in 2011-2012.

The bill requests the Mayor to report to the City Council by the June 4, 2013 Finance Committee meeting on the feasibility of such a performance contract.

Background Information: Several City Council committees have received briefings over the years by providers interested in exploring a conversion of the City's streetlights from the current high pressure sodium light to newer technology LED or metal halide lights, which produce a brighter, more true-color light at a cost savings in electrical consumption. Modern lighting control technology also offers opportunities for automatic dimming during late-night hours in areas where traffic is light, longer bulb life, and lower maintenance costs than the lights currently in use. The JEA currently maintains the City's streetlights, with the City paying the electric cost and a maintenance fee to the JEA.

Policy Impact Area: Electrical savings; enhanced street lighting and public safety

Fiscal Impact: Undetermined; new technology and more energy-efficient lamps offer the opportunity for substantial reductions in electric costs, but the capital cost for installation of new fixtures and lamps must be borne up-front and amortized by the cost savings over time.

The confluence of the IntraCoastal Waterway and the St. Johns River at Mile Point restricts timing of ships arriving and leaving port facilities. Modifications to the St. Johns River are required to meet the challenges of changing markets in shipping. Those modification include dredging the channel and disposing of the dredged material. This resolution expresses the Council's appreciation to the Governor and Legislature for their support of JaxPort's efforts to secure funding to correct Mile Point and providing essential funds for necessary replacement and repairs of marine facilities.

Bill Summary: This bill confirms the appointment of Gaylord George Candler to the Jacksonville Ethics

Commission, replacing Tatiana R. Salvador for a partial term ending December 31, 2014.

Background Information: The Jacksonville Ethics Commission is established pursuant to Chapter 602, Part 9, *Ordinance Code*, and empowered to review, interpret, render advisory opinions and enforce Chapter 602, *Ordinance Code*; and, in accordance with Section 1.202, *Municipal Charter*, to exercise the following powers and duties:

- Authorized to receive, and to investigate and issue findings with regard to complaints alleging an ethics violation:
- Provide assistance and input into the management and coordination of the training and education of local officers and employees in state and local ethics, including the City's Ethics Education Program, as well as all public records and sunshine law training throughout the government;
- May, upon employee or citizen complaint, or upon its own initiative, seek information and gather
 facts for the purpose of reviewing any circumstance or situation of which the Commission may
 become aware that appears to violate or may potentially violate an acceptable standard of ethics
 conduct for City officers and employees;
- Jurisdiction to levy those civil fines or penalties authorized in Chapter 602 for violations of the City's ethics code; and
- Act as the hiring committee, subject to Council confirmation, for the executive director of the Ethics Oversight and Compliance office.

Section 602.912, *Ordinance Code*, provides that one of the nine members of the commission shall be appointed by the President of the Council and confirmed by Council.

Dr. Candler received his Ph.D. from Indiana University with a concentration in Public Policy, Comparative Politics and Environmental Policy and is an Associate Professor with the *University of North Florida*. He resides in Jacksonville Beach within Council District #13.

Because Dr. Candler's initial term will be for less than 50% of a full term three-year term, this term will not be considered a "first full" term for reappointment purposes in accordance with Section 602.912(a), Ordinance Code.

Background Information: The Health Planning Council of Northeast Florida, Inc. is established pursuant to Section 408.033, *Florida Statutes*, and authorized to develop a district health plan; advise the state department on health care issues and resource allocations; promote public awareness of community health needs; collect data and conduct analyses and studies related to health care needs of the district; advise and assist local governments on the development of an optional health plan; and monitor and evaluate the adequacy, appropriateness and effectiveness of funds distributed to meet the needs of the medically indigent. The bylaws of the Health Planning Council provide that the Board of Directors shall be made up of health care consumers, providers and purchasers.

Bill Summary: This bill reappoints James E. Cobb to the Duval County Research and Development Authority, for

a fifth four-year term ending October 17, 2016.

Background Information: The Duval County Research and Development Authority is established pursuant to Chapter 67, *Ordinance Code*, and charged to oversee "First Coast Technology Park", a 285-acre commerce center at the University of North Florida; for the purpose of promoting scientific research and development in affiliation with and related to the research and development activities of one or more state-based, accredited, public or private institutions of higher education; for the purpose of financing and refinancing capital projects related to establishment of a research and development park in affiliation with one or more institutions of higher education, including facilities that complement or encourage the complete operation thereof; and for the fostering of the economic development and broadening the economic base of the county. Section 159.703, *Florida Statues*, provides that the members of the board shall be residents and electors of, or have their principal place of employment in, the county.

Mr. Cobb received a law degree from the University of Florida and is a partner in the law firm of *Peek & Cobb*. He resides in the Ortega area within Council District 14.

Bill Summary: The bill amends Ordinance Code Chapter 118 – City Grants – to alter the Public Service Grant process to provide an option for allocations based either on a grant application process or a request for proposals process as recommended by the PSG Council and selected by City Council. It increases the size of the Public Service Grant Council from 7 members appointed by the Mayor to 13 members, 7 of whom are appointed by the Mayor and 6 by the Council President, and provides that the Council President shall also appoint a City Council member as a liaison to the PSG Council. The bill requires that a minimum of two Mayoral appointees and two Council President appointees shall have prior experience with grant processes, either as grant writers, applicants, administrators or recipients. It adds language prohibiting any PSG Council member from participating in the review or consideration of any organization with which that member is affiliated as an employee, board member or consultant.

The amendment provides that the PSG Council shall annually review and consider the City's need for programs not already funded by City resources, recommend priority populations, and recommend a percentage allocation of available funds among the various suggested priorities using data sources and reports from organizations such as JCCI, the Non-Profit Center of Northeast Florida, the Jessie Ball DuPont Fund, the Community Foundation, United Way of Northeast Florida, the Disabled Services Council and the Health Planning Council of Northeast Florida. Priority needs recommendations shall be sufficiently narrow and specific so as to address a particular gap in available service and not so broad that every applicant is eligible for funding. It requires that supporting documentation from the grant or RFP review, scoring and ranking process be retained and available for public review, and provides a basic scoring methodology.

Background Information: The sponsor has spent considerable time observing the Public Service Grant Council in action and believes that the proposed amendments will provide for greater clarity, transparency and accountability in the PSG evaluation and recommendation process.

Bill Summary: The bill amends Ordinance Code Chapter 382 – Waste Collection and Disposal Service by Contractors – to require that effective September 1, 2013, the color of all waste disposal carts purchased by the City or by a contract hauler for City-sponsored service shall be forest green, dark gray or brown in color.

Background Information: The carts purchased by Southland Waste for use in its service area in Arlington and the Southside are royal blue color, with a matching blue lid for the garbage container and a yellow lid for the recycling container. Some residents have objected to the color as being too bright and excessively visible and expressed a preference for a more muted color.

Bill Summary: The bill authorizes the execution of a lease agreement between the City and Terranova, Inc. for the Supervisor of Elections office to continue its occupancy of its operations center at the Gateway Mall on Norwood Avenue for a period of 10 years. The lease provides that the landlord will make a list of substantial improvements to the facility and provides for an annual 3% rent escalation factor.

Background Information: The Supervisor of Elections occupies approximately 50,000 square feet of space in the Gateway Mall for the office's voting machine storage and testing facility and elections day operations center. Over the last several years the condition of the facility has deteriorated to an unacceptable level and the Supervisor and City Council have been considering alternative locations. The new owner of the Gateway Mall has offered to make substantial improvements valued at approximately \$450,000 to the facility (new HVAC system, separate utility meters, removal of an escalator and replacement with two elevators) and is offering a reduced rental rate beginning at \$24,583.33 per month in year one and escalating at 3% per year to \$32,075.67 per month in year ten. As an additional inducement to enter into the lease, the landlord offer a \$10,000 per month rent credit or cash reimbursement for the first six months of the new lease.

Policy Impact Area: Supervisor of Elections operations

Fiscal Impact: The new lease reduces the current lease rate by over 50% (\$24,583 per month versus the current \$51,000) in year one, with the rent escalating by 3% per year thereafter.

Bill Summary: The bill authorizes the Office of General Counsel to engage outside legal counsel – Allen, Norton & Blue, P.A. – to provide labor relations and collective bargaining services for the remainder of FY12-13 on a contractual basis for a price not to exceed \$150,000. The bill appropriates \$150,000 from the OGC's Retained Earnings account to its Professional Services account for this purpose.

Background Information: Within the last several months the General Counsel has accepted the resignation of 2 of the office's 4 attorneys with labor relations experience and she has determined that the anticipated high workload for legal services relating to negotiations with the City's 6 collective bargaining units over proposed pension plan changes and other employee benefits requires that outside counsel be retained to assist in this work for the remainder of the fiscal year. Allen, Norton & Blue will bill the City its governmental rate of \$245/hour for partners, \$180/hour for associates and \$90/hour for paralegals, plus expenses (filing fees, photocopying, courier service, long distance telephone calls, photocopying, etc.) up to a maximum engagement cap of \$150,000.

Policy Impact Area: Legal service provision

Fiscal Impact: The bill appropriates \$150,000 to an OGC professional services account, with a reverter clause providing that any unspent funds revert to the OGC's retained earnings account.
