Bill Summary: The bill approves an economic development agreement between the City and Project Volt (company identity temporarily confidential) regarding the use of two buildings in Jacksonville for a solar manufacturing and assembly operation and a corporate headquarters for U.S. operations creating 800 new full-time jobs. The bill evidences the City's commitment to a local Qualified Targeted Industry match of up to \$800,000 as the City's 20% match to the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity's (FDOE) \$3.2 million QTI grant for a total of \$4 million (\$2.4 million standard QTI, \$1.6 million High Impact Sector bonus). FDOE has authorized a reduction in the average salary for the jobs produced by the project from 115% to 100% of the average private-sector wage in the state as of January 1, 2018. The City also approves a Recapture Enhanced Value grant of up to up to \$23.8 million, representing the value of 75% of the increase in ad valorem taxes paid by the company over the first 10 years of operation. The bill provides for project oversight by the Office of Economic Development and affirms that the incentives comply with the provisions of the City's Public Investment Policy. Fast-track approval on 2 readings is requested.

Background Information: Project Volt is described as a leading international manufacturer of solar panels and modules, with 8 production plants around the world. The Jacksonville facilities would represent the company's first operations in the U.S. and would be the U.S. headquarters. The company proposes to establish a manufacturing plant in a recently constructed building at Cecil Commerce Center and an assembly and distribution facility in a building on Faye Road, with a combined capital investment of \$410 million (\$153 million in real estate improvements, \$257 million in machinery and equipment). The company anticipates utilizing the Port of Jacksonville for substantial imports and exports.

Policy Impact Area: Economic development; stimulation of port activity

Fiscal Impact: The City commits to a QTI match of up to \$800,000 and a REV grant of up to \$23.8 million over 10 years. The State of Florida would provide an additional \$8.2 million in QTI and High Impact Performance Incentives, a Capital Investment Tax Credit, a Veterans Florida Business Training Grant of up to \$200,000 for hiring and training veterans, an Urban Job Tax Credit of up to \$400,000 for jobs created at the Cecil Commerce Center location, and a 100% exemption of sales and use tax on the purchase of manufacturing machinery and equipment.

Bill Summary: The ordinance appropriates \$290,000.00 from the Sisters Creek Park Maintenance and Improvements Trust Fund to provide additional funding to address the needs of the Sisters Creek Dock Improvement Project, as initiated by B.T. 18-033; it amends the 2018-2022 five-year Capital Improvement Project, approved by Ordinance 2017-505-E, to provide additional funding for the project entitled, "Sisters Creek Marina/Boat Ramp.

Background Information: On an annual basis, the City submits grant applications to the Florida Inland Navigation District (FIND) requesting funding for specific waterways-related projects. FIND grant projects are usually eligible for up to 50% funding assistance. The City Council approved Resolutions2014-0022 (grant application) and 2015-38 for the Sisters Creek Dock Improvement Project. The funding in this appropriation comprises a transfer of \$290,000.00 from the Sisters Creek Park Maintenance and Improvements Trust Fund to the Florida Inland Navigation District account for the sisters Creek Dock Improvement Project. Any residual funds contributed by the Trust Fund will return to the fund of origin upon completion. The appropriation will enable the FIND grant project to move forward and be completed by the 2018 Jacksonville Kingfish Tournament. The project moves the existing floating docks outward to deeper water so they float during low tide making them usable by the boating public at all times. The project will result in reduced maintenance costs for the docks since the project corrects a problem that currently requires constant repairs. This is one of the most heavily used boat ramps in Jacksonville due to its proximity to offshore and its location at the intersection of the St. Johns River and the Intracoastal Waterway.

Policy Impact: Parks, Recreation and Community Services; FIND grants; Sisters Creek

Bill Summary: The bill appropriates \$206,000 from General Fund-GSD Fund Balance to the Medical Examiner's office for the purchase of a mobile office unit (\$26,325), an outdoor walk-in morgue cooler (\$86,880), morgue equipment (\$87,775.12) and miscellaneous construction costs for the installation of the new units. It amends the 2018-2022 Capital Improvement Program to provide additional funding for the existing Medical Examiner Facility – Additional Space project and finds that deferral of the amendment to the next budget cycle would be detrimental to the best interests of the community. The bill waives the provisions of the Procurement Code requiring a competitive procurement process for the purposes of allowing for quicker acquisition of the needed items utilizing a vendor already under contract to the Medical Examiner's Office for other work. Emergency passage of the bill on one reading at introduction is requested.

Background Information: The Medical Examiner's Office has been inundated in the last year with drug overdose deaths and has reached maximum body storage capacity several times in the past six months. This appropriation will provide funding to add capacity to store an additional 40 bodies and will provide additional office space for employees on a temporary basis while planning for an expansion or replacement of the Medical Examiner's current facility takes place.

Policy Impact Area: Medical Examiner's Office operations

Fiscal Impact: The bill appropriates \$206,000 from General Fund-GSD Fund Balance to the Medical Examiner's office for capital facility and equipment purchases.

Bill Summary: The ordinance appropriates \$210,000 from authorized capital projects and \$210,000 from Summit Construction Management Group, Inc. for the installation of a traffic signal at the intersection of Old St. Augustine Road and Livingston Road ("the signal"); it provides for a reverter of funds; it amends the 2018-2022 five year Capital Improvement Program, approved by Ordinance 2017-505-E, to provide funding for the project entitled "Traffic Sign-Old St. Aug Rd/Livingston Rd; it approves a signalization agreement between the City of Jacksonville and Summit Construction Management Group, Inc. to memorialize the shared responsibilities of the parties for the design and installation of the signal, located in Council District 6, related to a development known as "River City Science Charter School"; it provides for oversight by the Public Works Department; it authorizes the Mayor and Corporation Secretary to execute the agreement.

Background Information: The purpose of the appropriation is to provide funding for the installation of the traffic signal, designed by Summit and approved by the City, at the intersection of Old St. Augustine Road and Livingston Road, at a cost estimated to be \$420,000.00. Once the project is completed, any unspent funds from this appropriation shall revert to the county-wide Traffic Signalization project fund. The Planning and Development Department has recommended approval of the Signalization Agreement between the City and Summit Construction Management Group. The proposed traffic signal will be a "mast arm" construction accommodating a four lane median divided roadway with left turn bays.

Policy Impact: Public Works/Traffic Engineering

Fiscal Impact: The ordinance appropriates \$420,000.00. The Signalization Agreement stipulates that the City of Jacksonville and Summit Construction Management Group would split the costs of the project, 50-50.

Bill Summary: This bill approves and authorizes the Project Partnership Agreement between the Department of the Army and City of Jacksonville for Big Fishweir Creek restoration. The Engineering and Construction Management Division of the Department of Public Works will oversee the project.

Background Information: This legislation is necessary because urbanization, including encroachment along the banks of Big Fishweir Creek, and sediment transported by storm events have covered the natural creek bottom. This has caused a degradation of the natural habitat of the creek and creek banks. Big Fishweir Creek, which is classified by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection as a Florida Class III Waterbody, should be swimmable and fishable but in its current condition it is not. The United States Army Corps of Engineers-sponsored project will remove sediment buildup and nuisance and invasive vegetation, plant native emergent vegetation, and reconnect wetlands in Big Fishweir Creek from U.S. 17 to the St. Johns River. The removal of contaminated sediments and the restoration of the natural ecosystem will enhance and help improve the health of the St. Johns River.

Policy Impact Area: Big Fishweir Creek restoration

Fiscal Impact: No new costs to the city. Total project estimate \$6,539,700, with the City responsible for 35 percent of the costs. Funds were appropriated in previous two years' budgets (\$1.6 million in 2017 budget and \$966,375 in 2016 budget). No expected maintenance costs for the first five years after dredging.

By this ordinance, Patmos AD, LLC relinquishes its Non-Residential Solid Waste Collection and Transportation franchise back to North Florida Waste Management, LLC. North Florida Waste Management, LLC has certified that it is financially fit and has sufficient experience in the solid waste collection and transportation business to adequately perform all of Patmos's liabilities, obligations, conditions and standards under the franchise. North Florida Waste management, LLC has certified that it has the means to provide sufficient equipment and facilities to adequately perform all of Patmos's liabilities, obligations, conditions, and standards under the Franchise. The Department of Public Works recommends that North Florida Waste Management, LLC's application for the transfer of the Franchise from Patmos to North Florida Waste Management, LLC be granted.

Bill Summary: This bill, in accordance with Section 122.421(b), *Ordinance Code*, approves and authorizes: the conveyance by City Deed to the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) of Parcel 108, the subordination of City utility interests, the subordination to the interest of FDOT, rights-of-way in Parcels 101, 104, 105, 107, 110, and 806, a perpetual easement for parcels 800A – L, a temporary construction easement to FDOT in, over, and under Parcel 708, Parts A, B, C, and D. The Real Estate Division of the Department of Public Works will oversee the projects.

Background Information: The City authorizes a Quitclaim Deed conveying Parcel 108, an 812 square foot fee parcel located near the intersection of University Boulevard and Lawrence Place, to FDOT. The deed conveyance is needed for the FDOT University Boulevard Intersections Improvement Project in order to relocate Lawrence Place farther north, away from the University Boulevard and Atlantic Boulevard intersection, and for the addition of a right turn lane from northbound University Boulevard to eastbound Atlantic Boulevard.

The FDOT University Boulevard Intersections Improvement Project also requires subordination of the City's interest in utility easements to FDOT in Parcel 100, Parts A, B, and C, and in Parcel 107A located off University Boulevard South. These parcels are needed for the addition of a right turn lane from northbound University Boulevard to eastbound Atlantic Boulevard. The rights-of-way in Parcels 101, 104, 105, 107, 110, and 806 will be subordinated to FDOT for the addition of a right turn lane from northbound University Boulevard to eastbound Atlantic Boulevard.

The City will grant perpetual easements over Parcel 800, Parts A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I J, K, and L, all within the right-of-way of University Boulevard South (Richards Street, Mt. Carmel Terrace, Terry Road, Kennerly Road, Booth Road, and Bartram Road) for the construction and maintenance of signalization features within the rights-of-way of the connection city streets. FDOT will also be granted a temporary construction easement, in, over, and under Parcel 708, Parts A, B, C, and D for Signalization/Lighting/ADA improvements.

Bill Summary: The bill restates the City Council's intent to create the KingSoutel Crossing Community Redevelopment Agency and to have the Council act as both the governing body and the "agency", which is specifically classified as a dependent special district pursuant to state law. The bill directs the Office of General Counsel to revise Ordinance Code Chapter 500, Community Redevelopment - Policies and Procedures, to clarify and codify the authority, processes and procedures to be used by community redevelopment agencies as dependent special districts that are governed by the members of the City Council.

Background Information: In 2008, after a 2-year study and plan development process, the City Council adopted the Soutel/Moncrief Retail Redevelopment Area Redevelopment Plan. Later in that year it expanded the geographic boundaries and renamed the expanded district as the KingSoutel Crossing Community Redevelopment Area. Although the City Council was named in the ordinance as both the "agency" and the governing body of the district, the ordinance also mistakenly referenced the then-Jacksonville Economic Development Commission as the "agency". This discrepancy came to light in 2017 as the City registered its various CRAs with the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity as dependent special districts. Since the district has changed names and area over time and because of the confusion in the designation of the "agency" in the original legislation, the KingSoutel Crossing Community Redevelopment Agency has recommended that the City Council restate and clarify its intentions regarding the governance of the redevelopment area and to amend Ordinance Code 500 to make other changes as may be necessary to clarify the definitions of "agency" for each of the CRAs governed by the City Council and to otherwise update and modernize the chapter to ensure accuracy and clarity.

Policy Impact Area: Community redevelopment

Fiscal Impact: Undetermined; a complete revision of Ordinance Code Chapter 500 will require considerable City staff time and will incur additional costs by the codifier, Municipal Code Corporation.

The boundary of the project requires an expansion to utilize designated funding. The inclusion of the additional right-of-way on Norfolk Avenue would secure the appropriate border of the project. This particular area was designated as blighted under Council Resolution 2017-608-A. The Board reaffirmed the necessity for a Redevelopment Plan update in Resolution KSC/CRA 2017-01. This action also approved the procurement of professional services, not to exceed \$125,000, to fulfill the contract to update the 2008 Redevelopment Plan.

Bill Summary: The bill establishes an honorary street designation on Hema Road from New Kings Road to West Virginia Avenue South to recognize Jessie Jenkins Boddie and authorizes the erection of two honorary roadway historical markers. The bill waives the Ordinance Code provision providing that honorary street designations may only be made for persons who resided within 5 miles of the location of the designation for a period of at least 10 years.

Background Information: Jacksonville native Jessie Jenkins Boddie earned bachelor's and master's degrees in elementary education from Florida A&M University and had a long and distinguished career as an educator in the city, including serving as the first African-American principal at Grand Park Elementary School, and as principal of Rufus E. Payne Elementary School for 22 years. She was an effective mentor, and numerous of her staff went on to become principals themselves. Ms. Boddie died in 2006. The waiver of the residency requirement is requested because, while she was not an area resident, the school for which Ms. Boddie was a principal for 22 years is located on Hema Road. A private party has donated the funds to pay for the erection of the two honorary designation markers.

Bill Summary: The bill repeals prior ordinances 2012-438-E and 2015-663-E regarding a Living Shoreline Project at the Jacksonville Zoo and Gardens and authorizes the execution of a new agreement between the Zoo and the City for funding of the project. The bill appropriates \$165,000 from the Environmental Protection Trust Fund (EPTF) as a contribution toward the construction cost of the project and designates the EPB as the City's oversight agency for the project. The bill invokes the exception provided in the Procurement Code to permit direct contracting for professional services with Onsite Environmental Consulting, LLC (OEC) as designated by City Council.

Background Information: The Living Shoreline Project is a joint effort by the Jacksonville Zoo and Gardens and the City's Environmental Protection Board to install alternative shoreline stabilization methods to typical bulkheads and to promote nature habitats on the Trout River on the southeastern portion of the zoo property as a means to educate the general public about the importance of living shorelines. Wave attenuators would be placed along the shoreline to block wave action and shoreline erosion, the shoreline would be planted with appropriate vegetation, and an existing boardwalk would be extended to the site with a viewing platform and interpretive signage to provide visitors with information about the flora and fauna of healthy shorelines in Florida. The City appropriated \$25,000 toward the project in the 2012 ordinance subject to OEC raising an equal amount of matching funds, which it has thus far been unable to do, so the City funds have not been disbursed. The EPB believes the demonstration project is valuable, providing an easily accessible opportunity for tens of thousands of zoo visitors to see practical applications of non-hardscape (i.e. non-bulkhead) shoreline protective methods and to learn about the importance of natural shorelines for plant and animal life. Students from the Jacksonville University Marine Science Research Institute and Terry Parker High School will volunteer with the project.

Fiscal Impact: The bill appropriates \$165,000 from the Environmental Protection Board (EPB) as a contribution toward the construction cost of the project. The prior appropriation of \$25,000 from 2012, extended in 2016, is repealed.

The total budget for Phase 1 of the Lonnie Miller Regional Park project remains unchanged. One cycle emergency passage is requested.

Background Information: When the Lonnie Miller Regional Park project was approved in 2016 the attached BT established project accounts for each of the 7 elements in Phase 1: amphitheater stage; 8 basketball courts; multiuse field; picnic pavilion at the basketball courts; picnic pavilion at the tennis courts; northwest parking lot; southwest parking lot. The accounts had dollar amounts (interpreted as maximum amounts) attached to each project based on initial construction cost estimates. With construction of the amphitheater stage underway, it has become apparent that the funds allocated to that project will be insufficient to cover the full cost of that element. The Parks, Recreation and Community Services Department has requested authorization to combine the 7 project elements into a single Lonnie Miller Park Phase 1 project account, within which funds can be administratively transferred from one element to another as circumstances may require. The overall budget for Phase 1 is not being increased. Emergency passage on one cycle is requested in order to allow reallocation of funding to the amphitheater stage element currently under construction so that project can continue to completion.

Fiscal Impact: No change in overall project budget; funds may be transferred administratively among the 7 elements as needs change.

The vehicles will be transferred to the Town of Baldwin at no cost to be used by the town for municipal purposes.
