General Services District (GSD - countywide), excluding Urban Services Districts 2-5: 11.0725 mills GSD within USD 2 (Jax Beach), USD 3 (Atlantic Beach), and USD 4 (Neptune Beach): 7.7215 mills GSD within USD 5 (Baldwin): 9.2660 mills

The bill proposes the following millage rates to fund the Mayor's proposed FY 2015-16 budget: General Services District (GSD), excluding Urban Services Districts 2 – 5: 11.4419 mills GSD within USD 2 (Jax Beach), USD 3 (Atlantic Beach), and USD 4 (Neptune Beach): 8.1512 mills GSD within USD 5 (Baldwin): 9.6312 mills

Finally, the bill sets the required public hearing on the proposed millage rate and tentative budget for the Council meeting of September 8th and requests emergency adoption of the resolution.

The bill is requested for emergency passage on first reading in order to meet the state mandated deadline of August to report a proposed millage rate to the Property Appraiser for mailed notification to all property owners.

Background Information: Florida law requires that the City annually publish the "rolled back millage rate", which is the millage rate that would be required to be levied on this year's (higher) property valuations to produce the same amount of ad valorem tax revenue produced by last year's millage rate. The county millage rates for the current year as follows: GSD (outside USDs 2-5) – 11.4419; GSD in USDs 2-4 – 8.1512; GSD in USD 5 – 9.6312. The Property Appraiser's preliminary (end of June) taxable value roll for 2015 is \$52,548,406,192 up 5.9% from \$49,616,435,721 in June of 2014.

Bill Summary: The bill adopts the 2015-16 budgets for the City and its independent agencies and authorities. The proposed General Fund GSD departmental expenditure budget is \$943,869,609, with a total City departmental expenditure budget (General Fund, Special Revenue, Capital Projects, Enterprise, Internal Service, Trust and Agency Funds, and Other Component Units) of \$1,732,626,617. Non-departmental expenditures, interfund transfers and reserves are budgeted at \$392,107,269 for total appropriations, reserves and cash carryover of \$2,124,733,886.

The bill sets an employee cap of 7,097. The 5-year financial projection estimates the City's General Fund GSD non-departmental revenues to increase by 8.2% from \$1,000,263,168 million (proposed) in FY15-16 to \$1,083,264,118 in FY19-20, with property taxes projected to grow slowly but steadily throughout the period, "contributions from other local units" declining substantially, half cent sales tax revenue and state-shared revenues growing substantially, and all other sources remaining nearly flat. The bill establishes a City Public Service Grant program allocating \$5,118,772 and allocates \$71,065,336 for capital improvements. The bill sets the employer's contributions (percentage of covered payroll) to the various pension plans at 33.5% for the General Employees' Pension Fund, 68.64% for the Corrections Officer's Pension Fund, and 109.92% for the Police and Fire Pension Fund, plus an additional \$5 million for UAAL pay-down pursuant to Ordinance 2015-304-E.

The bill waives provisions of Ordinance Code that require the City to increase funding for the Jacksonville Children's Commission each year by an amount equal to the average percentage increase in all City operating department budgets, up to the value of ½ mill and waives the Ordinance Code requirement that the Mayor annually calculate and report unit cost measures and service quality measures for City government operations. The bill waives the Code with regard to the method for setting the salaries of City Council members so as to keep the base salaries for council members the same in FY15-16 as in FY11-12. Conflicting provisions within Code Section 10.105 regarding Council members' postage and communication expenses are waived so as to reduce the communication expense allowance to the lower of the conflicting provisions. The bill waives the Code requirement that vehicle replacement be done on a cash basis. The bill waives the restriction that the Banking Fund may not be used to purchase items with a unit value of less than \$50,000 in order to permit the fund to be used for the purchase of fleet vehicles. It also waives the provision requiring funding to the JSEB and MBE programs in a minimum amount of \$500,000 (excluding staff costs).

The bill also authorizes amendment of the Capital Improvements Element of the 2030 Comprehensive Plan to reflect the updated CIP project list. The bill waives the provision of the Ordinance Code which specifically excludes "routine roadway resurfacing" from the definition of "capital improvement" in order to permit roadway resurfacing to be capitalized in FY15/16. It provides that any residual funding remaining in a capital project budget when the project is deemed completed by the Public Works Director shall be transferred to a fund balance account for subsequent appropriation by City Council. Residual funds from completed projects originating from City Council district accounts or from the Special Council Reserve account shall revert automatically to those funds. No project shall be deemed complete and closed out without the preauthorization of the district council member in whose district the project is located. The Public Works Director is required to make a quarterly report to the City Council of all projects deemed to be completed. The bill acknowledges receipt of the required annual report from the Budget Office of all Capital Improvement Projects Not Lapsed. The bill also includes an exhibit of all Community Redevelopment Area (CRA) capital projects which are not considered a part of the CIP but are presented for informational purposes and do not comply with the requirements of Sec. 122.605(c) of the Code.

Background Information: The CIP proposes General Fund project spending of \$48,965,336 million in FY15/16, with \$7 million of that amount being in the form of Banking Fund borrowing. The largest projects are \$9.5 million for roadway resurfacing, \$5 million for Liberty Street/Coastline Drive repairs, \$4 million for Chaffee Road infrastructure and \$3.4 million for an extension of New World Avenue. \$11 million of stormwater projects is proposed with no borrowing. \$11 million is allocated for Trail Ridge Landfill expansion.

The Banking Fund borrowing cap is set at \$598,682,134 in net project funds (comprised of \$722,381,135 in cumulative new project authorizations offset by \$123,699,001 in completed or de-authorized projects). The bill recognizes the fact that the City Council has authorized \$120,580,711 of net project funding that has not yet been borrowed.

Background Information: The Banking Fund has for the last 10 years been the primary source of borrowing for the City's capital improvement projects, although its use is substantially reduced for the proposed FY15-16 budget. The largest Banking Fund allocations for FY15-16 are for fleet vehicle replacements (\$15,902,697) and ADA compliance curb cuts, ramps, sidewalks, park and public building modifications (\$7 million).

Background Information: Deutsche Bank originally located an American operations center in Jacksonville in 2008, committing to create 1,000 financial services jobs. The company expanded in 2012 and 2013 adding 560 additional jobs. The company currently employs over 1,600 workers in 130,000 square feet of leased office space on Jacksonville's Southside. The company proposes to add another 475 full-time employees earning an average salary of \$64,356 plus a benefits package valued at \$18,000 annually. The total incentive package for the project is \$5,481,500, of which the State of Florida will provide \$4,372,500 (QTI - \$2,280,000; Quick Action Closing Fund - \$1 million; Quick Response Training Grant - \$1,092,500) and the City will provide \$1,109,000.

The Department of Revenue has until July 15th to communicate any proposed amendments to the property appraiser and the county commission, and those officers then have until August 15th to make any comments or request further amendments of the DOR. On or before August 15th the DOR shall certify a final budget for each property appraiser, which must be funded by the county commission.

New Property Appraiser Jerry Holland presented his proposed budget to the Finance Committee on July 20th and the Council Auditor's Office noted that the budget contained \$199,733 for "competitive pay adjustments" to the salaries of particular positions as a result of a market salary survey, \$78,713 for a 2% merit pay pool, and \$86,744 for increased pension contributions on the increased salaries. The Finance Committee objected to those proposed increases since other non-union employees of the City have not received pay raises in a number of years and requested the Property Appraiser to remove them from his budget. Mr. Holland reported the DOR had already approved his budget with the raises included and the committee requested the Finance Director to appeal the inclusion of those raises to the DOR prior to the August 15th deadline for comments or testimony on the budget.

Background Information: In September 2014 the City entered into a management agreement with 13-JAX, Inc. to serve as the manager of Hemming Park. The agreement required Friends of Hemming Park to raise "private donations" of \$250,000 in the first year of the contract, in return for which the City would appropriate \$1 million toward park improvements and operations. A disagreement has arisen over the definition of the term "private donations" and whether funds generated by FOHP's revenue-generating operations should count as donations for the purpose of meeting Performance Standard #1. The City withheld its June \$150,000 matching payment because FOHP's latest payment included operating revenues and not purely private donor contributions. This bill would provide that revenue generated from activities in the park qualify to meet FOHP's financial contribution obligations.

Policy Impact Area: Hemming Park operations

Fiscal Impact: Allowing operating revenues to count toward FOHP's \$200,000 fundraising goal by June would qualify the organization for the next \$150,000 City payment toward its \$1 million commitment over 18 months.
