Bill Summary: The bill directs the administration to immediately cease payroll deductions for employee flexible spending accounts and to return any deducted funds currently being held by the City to any employee who requests a refund. The bill instructs the City to demand a refund from the City's flexible spending account contractor – EBS Atlanta – of all City of Jacksonville employee funds in its possession and directs the Department of Employee Services to monitor and enforce implementation of the ordinance. The bill declares that the City will be legally responsible for financial losses suffered by employees as a result of any default of EBS Atlanta with regard to the flexible spending plan and requires that any successor chosen by the City to take over the flexible spending contract must be FDIC and City Council approved. Emergency action is requested on the bill.

Background Information: Federal law authorizes the creation of tax-advantaged flexible spending accounts by which employees may have pre-tax dollars deducted from their pay and held in individual accounts to be used to pay medical, dental and vision care co-pays and deductibles, child care expenses, and limited parking and public transportation costs on a reimbursement basis after expenses are incurred. The accounts are governed by IRS regulations and their uses are limited to specifically authorized expenses. The City has for a number of years contracted with EBS Atlanta to manage the flexible spending accounts for City employees. Recently EBS Atlanta has defaulted on its payments to City employees and their care providers.

Background Information: The bill appropriates fines and assessments collected for violations of the City's property maintenance codes into an expenditure account to be used to pay the contractor hired by the City to perform the clean-up of cited lots and the demolition of condemned structures.

Policy Impact Area: Nuisance abatement

Fiscal Impact: The bill appropriates \$1 million in code violation fines and assessments to an expenditure account to clean up the violations that produced the revenue.

To the extent that claims are less than contributions to the fund, the participating agencies receive a refund of "excess contributions" after the close of the fiscal year and the processing of outstanding claims.

Policy Impact Area: Self-insurance

Fiscal Impact: The bill appropriates \$76,916.85 from the Insured Programs Account to the various contributing agencies according to their claims experience.

Background Information: Pursuant to Chapter 655, Part II, *Ordinance Code*, the City is authorized to enter into development agreements with owners or developers of real property for the reservation of facility capacity. On December 6, 2006, the City issued Conditional Capacity Availability Statement (CCAS) No. 48600 for 120 condominiums based upon the CCAS application submitted by the developer, Raymond Lane, Wilbeth, Inc. and Lane Land Trust. Because the development of the project, "Sweetwater Park," may involve multiple phases and will occur over an extended period of time, it is necessary for the developer to enter into this Agreement with the City in order to maintain a reservation of traffic circulation facility capacity through the project build-out. The reservation is subject to the payment of an annual renewal fee. The Planning & Development Department has recommended approval of the Development Agreement.

Fiscal Impact: The Development Agreement entails an annual renewal fee that the developer is committed to paying the City.

The Development Agreement acknowledges that because development of the project may involve multiple phases and will occur over an extended period of time, it is necessary to enter into an Agreement with the City in order to maintain a reservation of traffic circulation facility capacity through the project build-out. The Planning & Development Department has recommended approval of the Development Agreement.

Emergency approval is requested.

Background Information: The Sheriff reports identifying approximately \$5.16 million in salary and benefits savings in his current budget (1.46% of the FY11-12 departmental budget of \$352.5 million). As the Supervisor of Elections proposed in Ordinance 2012-143, the Sheriff proposes to apply \$1.8 million of the identified savings to paying off the JSO's Banking Fund indebtedness and then returning the remainder of the funds to be applied to the City's budget deficit.

Policy Impact Area: Budgetary reallocation

Fiscal Impact: The bill would apply approximately \$1.8 million in JSO budget savings to paying off the department's Banking Fund balance and would apply the remainder to budget deficit reduction.

Background Information: Florida Inland Navigation District grants are available that enable Counties to fund projects that enhance public access to waterways (i.e., docks, ramps, canoe or kayak launches, etc). The grants are generally 50/50 match arrangements. Currently, the City prioritizes proposed projects and proceeds to forward applications to FIND. FIND requires resolutions from the County's legislative body acknowledging the County's obligations regarding matching funds. This ordinance amendment would afford the Council (and the Jacksonville Waterways Commission) ample opportunities to closely examine and consider proposed priority projects *before* applying for the grants, in the event that proposed projects have to be altered or deleted.

Background Information: Shands Jacksonville and several of the other largest indigent care provider hospitals in the state participate in the "disproportionate share" program through which the hospitals turn their local indigent care funds over to the state to be used as matching funds to draw down enhanced Medicaid reimbursement for indigent care, thus substantially increasing the amount of care that can be provided as a result of the local appropriation.

Policy Impact Area: Indigent care funding

Fiscal Impact: The City's contribution to the disproportionate share fund is \$23,775,594. Due to the complicated formula used by the state and the earmarking of Medicaid funds for particular uses, it is reported to be difficult if not impossible to determine the exact dollar amount of additional funding the City's contribution leverages from Medicaid.
